

Library News




We hope your child has been enjoying their Italian lessons. Here are a few books which relate to Italiano!



In the streets and canals of Venice, Gabriella can hear nothing but sweet music. The drying laundry goes *slap-slap*, the church bells go *ting-aling-ling*, and the lire go jing-aling-ling. Soon, Gabriella is humming her way through town — and everyone hears her song!



Travel back in time to the days of the Roman Empire and join Tranio and his friend Livia, the baker's daughter, in witnessing the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in AD79. Tranio, like most Roman boys, likes to watch whatever is going on but one hot August day a very different scene unfolds.



Joe loves his Italian heritage: the language, the opera, the lasagne! But it's hard to celebrate his Italian roots in Bryn Mawr, South Wales, where his mam is sick of running the family's tatty café. Just like his great-grandfather, who opened the café in 1929, Joe is an entrepreneur. He vows to save the family business, and to spice up the tired High Street with a little Italian flavour! This is a heartwarming story about bringing a diverse community together and the amazing history of Italian immigrants in Wales.

This book tells the story of the construction of an architectural masterpiece--Brunelleschi's Cathedral of Santa Maria del Fiore in Florence was a marvel of art, architecture, and engineering. 


LEONARDO and the Flying Boy



























Following on from our fabulous trips to Slimbridge, here are wonderful bird related books!




This is a spellbinding story from the **bestselling author** of **The Girl of Ink & Stars** and winner of the Waterstones Children's Book Prize.

And yet, Asha has the unshakeable sense that the spirit bird of her grandmother – her nanijee – is watching over her ...



Full of fun facts about each bird species, you can press each page and listen out for the sounds of tropical birds, birds of paradise and even songbirds from your own back garden, in this stunning interactive book for young nature lovers.




































































Adult reads

Two entangled families.


A house with the darkest of secrets.





On a sweltering hot summer day, when the Harrington family discovers an abandoned baby deep in the shady woods, they decide to keep her a secret and raise her as their own.
