








New author news!




We are very excited to announce that our very own Mr Powe has just published a children's book! What started as a hobby during lockdown turned into a reality. The book is aimed at UKS2 and combines history with a bit of imagination too.



'The Bones of Becket' is a thrilling mystery based around a tantalising urban myth. Set in Canterbury, England, this riveting story merges the past and present into a lively and action-packed tale that keeps you guessing until the end. No-one else but Ambrose seems to care that the Professor is missing. That is until an eccentric doctor with a basset hound turns up, revealing a shocking clue to his friend's whereabouts. Ambrose can't resist the opportunity to be a detective, even though his older sister Isabella is somewhat reluctant to be an accomplice. What follows is a high-stakes quest to uncover a truth that's been buried for centuries, though Ambrose will soon find out that some people will do anything to keep a secret.


Chimpanzees






This is an interactive retelling of a classic fairy tale with flaps and peepholes that will keep children hooked!


In this enchanting book, Jackie Morris conjures a world where everyone has their own dragon.










Seahorses






It is night time and a herd of elephants are on the move. An impala is lying in the darkness, watching a tortoise stumble towards water. Hatchling turtles slip into the pool while crocodiles sleep. A pack of wild dogs trot by. When the tortoise slips, a surprising and remarkable chain of events begins to unfold...



This colourful and informative book divides Africa into five sections:
South, East, West, Central and North, each with its own introduction. This is followed by a page per country, containing a delightful mix of friendly text and colourful illustrations. With just a couple of facts per page, the book is perfectly geared toward readers aged seven and upwards.

Akimbo and his parents live on the edge of an African game reserve. It's his father's task to protect the thousands of amazing animals who make it their home, and wildlife-loving Akimbo dreams of helping him. In these three adventures, Akimbo protects elephants from poachers, saves a lion cub from a trap, and rescues a man from a crocodile!

This is the story of love, commitment and the flowering of the human spirit against the background of South Africa's apartheid. Frightened that their baby sister Dineo will die, thirteen-year-old Naledi and her younger brother Tiro run away from their grandmother to Johannesburg to find their mother, who works there as a maid. Their journey illustrates at every turn the grim realities of apartheid - the pass laws, racism, and the breakdown of family life. The opulence of the white "Madam's" house contrasts starkly with the reality that Naledi and Tiro face - that their baby sister is suffering from starvation, not an incurable disease.



Long Walk to Freedom by Nelson Mandela is the amazing story of a true hero of our times; his famous biography has been specially adapted for children in a beautiful illustrated picture book format. Discover how a little boy whose father called him "troublemaker" grew up to fight apartheid, become South Africa's first black president and campaign for freedom and justice throughout the world.






Otters and Cheetahs











Wolves and Lions



The Space We're In




Can You See Me?






The perfect accompaniment to Factopia is the fact-loving Freddie in *The Super Miraculous Journey of Freddie Yates* by Jenny Pearson.




The Tale of the Whale is a poetic story of a friendship between a child and a whale but it is also a plea to protect our seas from plastic pollution and to come together with others to do so.













This is a hilarious story about a musical note who tries his best to make the right sound in a tune but keeps making mistakes. The ending is unexpected and very funny (if not a little rude!)



This is an unforgettable tale of an orphan in Victorian London. It is based on the boy whose plight inspired Dr Barnardo to found his famous children's homes.














Adult reads


