
With term two drawing to its close, this Book Buzz is packed full of reading news from across our school.

Eight Nights, Eight Lights introduces the celebration of Chanukah through a wonderful story of community and traditions. It is a lovely overview of Chanukah traditions and helps children understand how what makes us different also makes us special. The final illustration showing a city filled with menorahs, Christmas trees, stars and a variety of religious buildings celebrates diversity and acceptance.

The Woodcutter and the Snow Prince is a beautiful Christmas story of love and friendship. The traditional tale of The Snow Queen has been transformed into something truly special.




Libby's incredible observation skills tell her that something isn't right in the house. A secret passageway, hints of an intruder and missing art work lead to an even bigger mystery.

The poems come to life and leap off the page: some are peaceful and beautiful, while others are laugh-out-loud funny.




The Grumpus by Alex T Smith.

The Christmas Carrollls by Mel Taylor-Bessent


Funny, festive book for younger key stage 2 readers about the world's most Christmassy family! And even better, there are two books about this crazy Christmassy family!












Imagine this: It's Christmas Eve and after receiving a brand-new book from your family, you cosy up in your favourite reading nook or in front of the fire with a mug of hot cocoa and spend the rest of the evening reading.

That's exactly how Icelandic people celebrate Christmas each year. This tradition is known as Jolabokaflod, which translates roughly to "Christmas book flood" in English.

Jolabokaflod started during World War II, when paper was one of the few things not rationed in Iceland. Because of this, Icelanders gave books as gifts while other commodities were in short supply, turning them into a country of bookaholics.

Ever since 1944, the Icelandic book trade has sent out a book bulletin to each household in the middle of November when the Reykjavik Book Fair happens. People use this catalogue to order books to give to their friends and family on Christmas Eve, the main gift-giving day in Iceland. After all the presents are open, everyone grabs a cup of hot chocolate and cosies up to spend the rest of the evening reading their books. What a wonderful tradition!






Every winter Poetry By Heart creates a special poetry advent calendar. The Poetry By Heart Festive Poe-tree advent calendar is a digital anthology of poems classic, contemporary and diverse – arranged in the shape of a Christmas tree with 24 little doors. From 1-24 December a door is unlocked each day and children and young people (adults too) can open it to find a festive poem. It's completely free for everyone to share and enjoy live from 1st December.
















Did you take part in the Summer Reading Challenge? The Winter Mini Challenge is a continuation of this, only it takes place online.
